FOR THE SESSION, 1897-8.

We, the Governors appointed by resolution of the Municipal Council of 10th May, 1897, beg to submit herewith our Report for the Session 1897-8. The outgoing Governors, on the 30th day of June, 1897, having furnished a Report on the Schools up to that date, we thought it unnecessary to submit the usual Report at the end of the School year, as we were then only a couple of months in office.

But as our predecessors were unable in their Report to give the results of the May Examinations, the returns of which were not then received from the Science and Art Department, we append them to this Report. Upon these results a sum of £164 5s. 6d. was paid by the

Science and Art Department (the largest sum ever earned by the Schools for result fees), and a further sum of £659 4s. 10d. was paid to us by the Department for the instruction given in Technology in the same year.

The Session opened upon Monday evening, the 26th September, 1897, and classes were held in the following subjects:—

Within a few weeks of the opening of the Schools upwards of 800 pupils were enrolled. This number was increased to 990 before the close of the Session; and had we not been compelled to refuse admission to a large number of pupils desirous of joining classes already overcrowded, this latter figure might have been considerably increased.

Owing to the overcrowding in previous years in the Freehand Drawing Classes, we decided to devote two extra evenings in the week to this subject, with the result that the attendance was more regular, and the results at the Examinations much better than those of previous years.

As there was no proper accommodation for the Practical Class in Painters and Decorators' Work, opened during the previous Session, we converted the old cottages vacated by the caretaker into a workshop for this class—a decided improvement, although it does not provide all the accommodation required.

The Class in Laundry Work was discontinued owing to insufficient attendance. An additional evening was given to the Class in Cookery, which prevented the overcrowding on the practice evenings, and thus greatly facilitated the work of the Teacher.

These alterations worked satisfactorily, were appreciated by the pupils, and tended to promote the more regular attendance, which, we are pleased to report, compares favourably with that of the previous Session, as may be seen from the following figures:—

At the Examinations held by the Science and Art Department, Francis D. Moulang obtained a Whitworth Exhibition value £50, and at the Examinations held by the City and Guilds of London Institute, Leo P. Ganter obtained First Prize, £2, and Silver Medal, in Clock and Watch Making. John M. Shackleton, Second Prize, £1 10s., and Bronze Medal, in Electric Lighting and Power Transmission.

Last Session the Schools came under the new regulations of the Science and Art Department, whereby pay-

ments on the results of the Examinations are abolished, and a system of payments on attendances instituted instead. As these payments are variable (being based partly upon the report of the Government Inspector, and partly upon the results of the Examination), we are unable at present to say how much the grant for Science and Art instruction will amount to for the Session.

We claim from the Science and Art Department a sum of £716 1s. 5d. for instruction in Commercial and Technological subjects, under minutes of the Department of 17th January, 1893, 1st May, 1894, and 19th March, 1897.

The Class in Irish was discontinued after Christmas, as no pupils presented themselves, and no one has since applied for instruction in this subject at this School.

Having before us the report of our predecessors, drawing attention to the very inadequate accommodation of the Schools, and having considered plans for their extension, we came to the conclusion that they were wholly inadequate, and, accordingly, we directed our Secretary to prepare a report on the requirements of the classes, and appointed a Sub-Committee, consisting of Councillor Beardwood, Mr. Patrick Dowd, Mr. John Good, Mr. Arnold Graves, Mr. J. F. Keatinge, and Mr. W. R. Molloy, to furnish a report, with plans for a new building. As this report, which we adopted, has already been printed and circulated among the Members of the Municipal Council, and their sanction obtained for the necessary loan to erect the new building, we think it unnecessary to refer further to this matter.

The fees received during the Session in the Science and Art Classes amounted to £100 5s., and in the Commercial and Technological Classes to £235 8s., making a total of £335 13s.

Private subscriptions received during the year amounted to £59 18s. The total income and expenditure of the Technological and Commercial Classes for the past two Sessions will be found appended (see Appendix).

A statement showing receipts and expenditure of the Science and Art Classes will be published in the Corporation Accounts.

We desire to return thanks to Lady Thomson, Mrs. Frazer, Mr. J. R. Boyd, Mr. M. Crowley, Mr. A. Conan, Mr. A. Purser, Mr. R.
