5. Mention and account for four important consequences of Ireland's geographical position.

6. What are the essential requirements of a successful port?

In the light of your answer examine any *two* of the following:—Cork, Derry, Dublin, Galway.

7. What factors contribute to the successful conduct of a manufacturing industry? Examine any large manufacturing industry in Ireland for the possession of these factors.

8. In 1931 the Imports of the Saorstát exceeded the Exports by over £13 millions. Does this mean that this money has been lost to the country? Give reasons for your answer.

2. Where in Ireland are the surface rocks (a) oldest, (b) youngest geologically? Take one of these areas and account for its geological formation.

Has the rock structure any influence on the economic life of that area?

3. Show by means of a map the most direct railway route between:—

Dublin and Waterford.

Rosslare and Cork.

Dublin and Derry.

Limerick and Sligo.

Indicate on your map the points at which the routes are markedly affected by physical features.
