SIM Fall - Structure and Activities The basic unit of Sinn Fein is the Cumann or club. In Dublin there are about 23 Cumains, each based in a certain area like Ballynus or Rathmines. Every year a Cumann has an Annual General Meeting at which the members elect an officer board, which is responsible for organising and co-ordinating the activities of the Cumann for the following year. An officer board pust consist of at least a Chairman, Secretary, Traesurers and delegate to the Combairle Commtair. Other essential positions are : Educational Officer, Public Relations Officer, and if possible a Finance Officer. Chalmaan: The Chairman's job is to ensure that the Curann involves itself in the activities of Sinn Fein as a whole and implements all decisions made by khow the organisation, where they affect the Cumnu. He/she must keep order at Curana meetings and see that the business of the meeting is carried cut properly and efficiently. The Secretary records all decisions made by the Cumann, in the minutes and deals with correspondence, filing etc. The Treasurer keeps a record of Cuman funds and all items of income and expenditure. Liminoial statement should be made at every Cumann meeting and a financial report given at the end of the year. The Public Relations Officer issues statements to the media making known the opinions of the Cumana to the people on any particular issue. In xxxx many Cumainn the FRO compiles a local newsletter to communicate to the pepple the viws of Sinn Pein on all issues, local and national, of feeting them. A newsletter helps to establish contact between the local Camana and the people as it can make the policies and ideology of the Movement relevant to the people in their day to day lives. Every marber of the Curam should contribute something to the Newsletter. The Education Officer fulfills a vital function in the Current. His/her job is to ensure that every member of the Cumann understands the basic policies and ideology of the Ecoublican Movement. Lectures are given at most meetings of the Cumann on various aspects of our policies and objectives. Every member should take part in the subsequent discussions. Education and discussion is designed as a guide to our activities so that we will be bet ar equipped to reach our goal with an aware and dedicated numbership. The COLDATILE CEALITY : (Aegional Executive), The Combainle Committee coordinatesthe activities of all Cumann and gives them leadership on major is sues. It is composed of an officer board, elected each year by the members at an Annual General Meeting, plus one delegate from each Cumann. In Dublin the Comhairle Ceanntair meets once a fortnight. The function of the delegate is to report the activities of the Cumann to the Comhairle Ceanntair to represent the views and proposals of the Carnan to it, and then to go go back to the Curona and give the members a report on the decisions taken by the Comhairle Committies A report should be given to the Cumann after The Officer Board meets once a week. every delegate meeting. ARD COMMATRIE : The Ard Commairle or Mational Executive is the governing body of Sinn Fein. It consists of IZ members, elected by delegates from every Current in the country at the Annual and Fheis. There are also delegates on the And Conhairle from each region and Conhairle Conbatair.

ARD FHEIS: The And Fheis is main policy making body of Sinn Fein. Resolutions from the Cumainn go forward to it on all aspects of our policies and on

structure and rules. All resolutions passed become the policy of Sim Fein for the next 12 months.

Sinn Foin therefore is a completely denocratic organisation at all levels ensuring the maximum participation of all members in policy formulation and organisation.

ACTIVITIES

I. Propaganda: One of the most essential activities of a Sim Fein Cumann is Propaganda, the dissemination of war Republican principles and policies among the people. If we want the support of the mass of the Irish people in the strug le for the re-conquest of Ireland we must make our policies and objectives clear to then. One of the best ways of doing this is through the sale of our papers, the United Irishian, the monthly journal of the Republican Movement, and the Trish People, the new weekly, urban paper. Members are required to sell the United Irish on at least once a wank week in pubs, at Churches, Shopping centres and any other outlets evailable.

- 2. Many Cumains operate a Citizens Advice Furesa, and there is also a Central CAB in Head Office. The function of the CAB is to establish a centre where people can come and have their problems dealt with. These problems range from bad housing conditions, Tenants in trouble with landlords or the Corporation, to people **expression* in trouble with the law who have no idea of how to get legal advice. The CAB is also an information center where the people can find at their rights under the Social **elfare Acts etc. A good Curamn can start successful agitations from CAB cases. The CAB also identifies Sinn Fein in the public mind as an organisation working for the people and defending their rights and interests. Every member should help in the work of their CAB, or if their Cumann does nt have one they should help out in the Central one, especially any member with specialists knowledge in law or Social Services, such as students or social workers.
- 3. In accord with Sinn Fein's policies of becoming involved in the day to struggles of the ordinary people, it is vitally important that a Cumann should have a high level of involvement in local organisations. This can only occur if the members of the Cum nn are members of the organisations of the people in their local area. The min peoples' organisations are Tenants and Residents Associations, also local youth clubs, cultural and sports organisations like the GAA and the Gaelic League, and economic organisations like Credit Unions. The excesses of private enterprise society forces working people to come together to defend their common interests. This is why Trade Unions and Tenants organisations are formed. As such these organisations have a vital role to play in the revolutionary struggle. First of all Republicans in these organisations must identify the main problems affecting or worrying the people. This can only be done by attending the meetings and taking part in the activities of Tenants and Trade Unionists. Howing identified the problems, we must discover the best means to fight for the peoples' rights. Our task then is to persuade the Tenants, for example, to adopt our skara strategy on the Rents Strike. If our tactics are correct, Republicans will be come identified as leaders of the peoples struggles. This policy not only gives the people a redical leadership, but it also involves the mass of the people in the struggle for the re-conquest of Ireland fix her people.
- 4. Each Cumann is obliged under the Constitution of Sinn Fein to adapt the policies of the organisation, where possible to special local conditions. Agitations could be started on ground rents, campaigns for more community facilities, more housing, employment etc. All instances of political patronage and corruptio, the disregard shown for the peoples' rights by speculators and developers should be exploited to the full and exposed by a Sinn Fein Cumann. The Irish language and culture should also be encouraged by Cumann. If halls are available locally a Cumann can run Ceilithe and ballad sessions. This generates an awareness among the people of their own culture and traditions, as well building up a Cumann's finances.
- 5. Since the ban on entry to Parliament has been removed, Sinn Foin will contest all local and general elections as far as our resources allow and candidates will take their seats where elected. The contesting of elections is likely to become an Increasingly important part of Sinn Foin's activities. Participation in Parliament is merely an extension of the Social, Economic and Cultural aspects of the struggle and brings the Fooples' fight into the heart of the enemy camp.
- 6. Sinn Fein relies for financial support primarily from its own members and supporters. A Cuman has to contribute something every month for the maintenance of the Comhairle Commain, and also has to pay an annual affiliation fee to the Ard Comhairle. In order to finance its own activities as well, a Cuman should have regular fund raising events. All members are required to take part in these, whether they be collections, socials, raffles etc. The rajor collections during the year are the National Collection and the Easter Lily collection at Easter.

DUTIES OF A MEASEN

- I. Every new member is on probation for a period of three morths. If at the end of that period he/she is found to be an unsuitable member or if you have not been an active member, you may be expelled from the organisation. Hew members must be in a Cuman for two months before they have a right to vote, and only those who have been in Sim Fein for at least Is months may be elected as officers, except in the case of new Cumann being formed.
- 2. Almost every Cumann meets once a week. Members should attend every Cumann meeting if possible. If a Cumann is to operate properly and efficiently it must have the maximum participation of all members, and if there is not a good attendance at Cumann meetings, very little activity can be planned or organised. Any member who attends less than I2 Cumann meetings a year, ceases to become a member of Sinn Fein. If you cannot attend a meeting, you should contact your Cumann Secretary, find wax out what activities have been organised and say when you are available for them.
- 3. At each Cumann meeting, a subscription is taken up from each member. This is usually a fixed arount, but students and unemployed members can subscribe only what they can afford. There is also a levy of 10p. per member per menth which goes to the Comhairle Ceanntair.

 All new members must become registered members of Sinn Foin immediately. If you are not given a registration form to fill out, ask the Secretary to get one. You then get a membership card, which costs 50p. Members must be registered once a year.
- 4. A member has a daty to become involved in as many areas of Current activity as possible, both internal and external. External activity consists of Paper sales, Citizens Advice Eureau work, local agitations, activities or anised by the Combairle Ceanatair and Ard Combairle etc. Internal activity: this consists of the Educational Programs, discussions and the internal business of the Cuman. Hambers should contribute and take part in the Cuman's discussions. An organisation is only as good as its members are, so the more discussion, constructive ideas and proposals from the ordinary members, the better revolutionary organisation we will have.
- 5. A resolution was passed at the 1972 Ard Fheis, making it compulsory for all members of Sinn Fein (who are eligible to do so) to join a Trade Union. The Trade Union Movement is the largest and most powerful working class organisation in the country, so it absolutely vital that Republicans join their Trade Unions and not simply join them, but be active in promoting the rights and interests of Irish workers.
- 6. A member of Sime Fein cannot belong to any other political party. Your first and only political allegiance must be to Sime Fein. There is no room for divided logalties or ambiguities. If we want to load the Irish people in a Socialist Revolution, we must have a single-minded party of dedicated revolutionaries, totally convinced of our aims, policies, tactics and strategy.

No member of Sim Foin can be also a member of the Free State armed forces or police.

Weither is there any room in this Movement for passengers. To only want people who are prepared to become active Republic Socialists, people who are determined to fight and eventually overthrow the established order and Imperialist domination of our country, to the best of their talents and abilities.
