This edition marks the relaunch and rebranding of the journal, a project we have been working on for over a year, and the content of which is based on the postgraduate research seminar entitled "Contextualising Trauma and Disadvantage" organised by the National Centre for Franco-Irish Studies (NCFIS) at the Technological University Dublin in November 2022.

The *Journal of Franco-Irish Studies* (JOFIS) is peer-reviewed, open access and will publish two issues each year. One issue will be the proceedings of the annual postgraduate research seminars at TU Dublin and will be published in November. The most recent of these seminars took place in October and that issue, which will be entitled "Text, Performance and Community," is already underway. We aim to publish this issue around May each year. Preparations for the first of those issues has also begun. Javier Torres-Fernández whose steering of this particular ship was such that he simply could not be allowed to leave, and to our delight has accepted to join the editorial team on a permanent basis. Our thanks also to Aisling Coyne, Open Scholarship Librarian at TU Dublin, for her assistance and advice, in particular with the journal's online format and content.
