1. Write a concise geographical account of *one* of the following areas:—

- (a) Lough Neagh Basin
- (b) Basin of the Liffey.
- (c) Your local region.

2. "That the latitude of Ireland places it in the north of the north temperate zone is probably the most important fact in the whole of Irish geography."—Why is so much importance attached to this fact? Explain fully.

3. Compare and contrast the climate of Kerry with that of Westmeath. Account fully for the facts.

4. Draw a sketch map to show the location of Peat deposits in Ireland. Write a note on the possibility of the increased use of peat as a fuel here, paying attention to the effects of its extended development on employment, agriculture and external trade.

5. What is an anticyclone? What are its effects on Irish weather?

6. Account for the position and importance of any *three* of the following:—Drogheda, Enniskillen, Lifford, Mallow, Tralee, Wexford.

7. What are the principal wheat-growing areas in Ireland? State the conditions necessary for the economic production of wheat. How far do the areas you name possess these conditions?

8. Write a note on the fishing industry of South Western Ireland. Indicate main centres, markets for the catch and the possibilities of further development in the industry.
