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Letter from Cllr. Eric Byrne re. Mount Jeome Cemetery

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MOUNT JEROME CEMETERY

Dear Resident,

Mount Jerome Cemetery which was established under an Act of Parliament in 1834 contains the remains of nearly 500,000 people.

Buried in the cemetery, with it's neo-Egyptian vaults, and predominantly neo-classical monuments, are many famous people like Thomas Davis, Thomas Gresham (of hotel fame), Walter Osbourne, John Millington Synge and a group of Huguenots reinterments from French Peters grave, in Peters Street. The Huguenots are commemorated on a Slab bearing an exhaustive list of Huguenot names.

Also buried there are the remains of our loved ones, our brothers and sisters, aunts and uncles, husbands and wives, sons and daughters, who are dear to us in life and in death.

Mount Jerome, which was described in 1834 as a "beautifully picturesque Demesne, adjoining the village, comprised 25 acres of gently alleviated ground embellished with lawns and growth giving it an air of seclusion and a solemnity aspect, peculiarly appropriate."

NOT ANYMORE CAN IT BE SO DESCRIBED. In recent times Mount Jerome has been described as a <u>dump!</u>

In 1984 the General Cemetery Company went into voluntary liquidation and was temporarily closed. The cemetery has, since that time deteriorated to the extent that many people are concerned about it's future. Could it close again? Why is it's upkeep so deplorable?

In order to address these issues in an organised and orchestrated way a committee known as the Relatives & Friends of Mount Jerome Committee is being established as a non-political campaigning committee which will seek to have a say in the direction Mount Jerome is going.
